Our grant of £2000 from the Tesco Bags of Help Community Fund to support the relocation project is now spent and flitting all our gear from Kirroughtree to the Tennis Club is done.



We have sent in the final project completion report to Tesco and it has been accepted. This means we can apply again to the fund, so we are putting together a bid for some more cash for a 3D projector to go with our planned mobile planetarium dome for use with schools and youth groups in Wigtownshire, see below!



The next tranche of cash from the Co-op LocalCommunity fund will arrive soon and will go into the pot for the the purchase of a mobile planetarium dome for use with schools and youth groups around Galloway and South Carrick, in the west and south of the Galloway Forest Dark Sky Park. We think we are now able to buy a dome and a simple projection system, thanks to a very generous grant from the Kilgallioch Community Fund. Planetarium Project Funded



For some years now the Society has wanted to buy a portable planetarium to use in a programme of visits to schools and youth organisations so as to give a gentle introduction to astronomy for as many youngsters as possible. Until now this has seemed beyond our powers but we are delighted to say that, at last, following a successful application to the Kilgallioch Community Fund, we can move on to buy the society a suitable inflatable dome with a simple projection system.



Earlier this year we submitted an application to the Kilgallioch Community Fund for several thousand pounds of capital to finance the purchase. The fund managers were very helpful and we had some clarification meetings with the fund's advisory team. At the end of June we were delighted to learn that the fund's trustees had agreed to meet our bid in full. This is an immense compliment to GFAS from the Kilgallioch Trust but it also puts a great responsibility on our members to see the project through. Any member who feels able to join in to help with any of the planned school visits, please let us know!

Together with other, smaller, grants from the Co-op Community Fund and a little of our own reserves, we think we will be able to reach a decision on ordering a suitable dome and a simple projection system after our next management committee meeting in August. Our first dome event will, of course, be for GFAS members and their guests and after that we will be busy arranging one session per month in schools in Wigtownshire, the Stewartry and South Carrick, the area covered by the Kilgallioch Windfarm Trust. Schools visits will be free and will form a big part of the Society's charitable work.

As well as the programme of visits described in the funding application, the dome will be able to be used by other community groups across Galloway, so long as community groups are willing to meet our expenses.

Spectacular July Midnight coming up

Mars is at opposition on 30th July. Mars and Earth both orbit the sun, but at different distances and different speeds. Every two years or so, Mars, Earth and the sun form a straight line during the course of their orbits, with Earth in the middle, an event known as "opposition". It's as close as Mars gets to us. On 27th July, after 11:00 pm, the full moon, Mars, Saturn and Jupiter are all on show in the southern sky. Clear skies!
